# Community Development in El Paso County, Colorado

El Paso County received over \$1M in federal funding for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program to improve the physical, economic, and social conditions for low-and-moderate income residents. El Paso County also received over \$1M in federal funding for the Community Development Block Grant-Covid (CDBG-CV) Program to assist in the prevention, preparation, and response to the spread of COVID-19. The projects funded by CDBG and CDBG-CV dollars help build neighborhood resiliency through supportive services, infrastructure improvements, advancement of housing safety and accessibility, housing stability, emergency shelter, whole family health and safety services for youth, seniors and people with disabilities, homelessness prevention, rehousing and more.

**419** eligible seniors were provided nutrition assistance as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic.

**59** homeless youth were provided services such as overnight shelter and service engagement; **13** entered housing programs



7 owner-occupied homes received urgent health and safety-related repairs and improvements to ADA accessibility



**332** people received emergency rent, mortgage, or utility assistance and prevented potential homelessness



**45** people were taught new skills and received career mentorship to gain new employment opportunities and improve self-sufficiency post-pandemic



**2,402** rural seniors were assisted in getting rides to a variety of locations, such as vaccine appointments, medical care, and the grocery store/pharmacy



**109** veterans were provided case management and wraparound services to improve self-sufficiency and employment
